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Golf Simulator

The ground is starting to freeze and snow flurries have been sighted - but that doesn't stop the Parkway boys and girls golf teams from continuing to prepare for the fall 2024 golf season. During the winter months, golf athletes continue working to develop their golf skills inside Parkway's indoor golf simulator. The purchase of upgraded golf simulator equipment was made possible in 2022 through golf team fundraisers, the Parkway Athletic Department, and the Parkway Athletic Booster Club.

"Student-athletes having access to an indoor simulator is more than just playing holes. This technology provides golfers the opportunity to learn so much more about their golf swing. The simulator program provides immediate feedback such as swing speed, launch angle, spin rate, and carry distance." explained boys golf coach, Ryan Thompson. "During the offseason, our athletes can make adjustments to the mechanics of their golf swing and receive instant feedback." Parkway's golf simulator uses the FlightScope Mevo+ launch monitor that offers players multiple driving range and short game practice opportunities along with access to five different 18-hole golf courses.

The indoor simulator is a well-used practice facility during the winter months. The simulator room, located in Room #325 in the middle school hallway, is open multiple days each week to interested student-athletes during the months of November-March. Last winter, 26 different athletes accessed the golf simulator playing nearly 1,300 holes of golf during the winter months.

The high school golf season is played in August-September each fall. Voluntary practices are held during June-July at the Celina Lynx Golf Club. Any high school student or 8th grader interested in learning more about playing golf next year are encouraged to visit the golf simulator or reach out to one of the high school golf coaches.
